Summer is well underway and so is the concert series in R Park. This is the third year that a group of residents have organized summer concerts in R Park.

“After the beautiful renovation of the park we really wanted to use the pavilion as a way to bring neighbors together,” said Laura Savidge, who leads the group of volunteers. “Through this concert series, I really think we’ve done that. This is like a dream come true for us.”

This year, the concert series included four different events taking place on June 1st, July 27th, August 24th and September 14th. The concerts are completely free to attend, making it easy to gather your friends and family, and enjoy an evening outdoors without breaking the bank.

An important component of these free concerts is to support charitable causes. This year, proceeds from food and drink sales will support The Giving Brick, the Community Food Pantry at Trinity Lutheran Church and the Holiday Kindness Project.

The Giving Brick provides previously loved Lego sets to underprivileged kids and throughout the foster care system. The Holiday Kindness Project is in partnership with the Roeland Park PD where gift cards to local retailers are given to unsuspecting Roeland Park shoppers by officers during the holiday season. Volunteers will be collecting nonperishable food for the Community Food Pantry at the concerts. Consider showing your appreciation for the free event by bringing canned or boxed items with you.



For those who enjoy a cold brew on a warm evening, a selection of beers from Sandhills Brewing will be available to keep you refreshed and in high spirits. There will also be non-alcoholic beverages, snacks and baked goods available for a donation.

Letter From Mayor Poppa

Hey, RP,

Did you know that we have a primary election on Tuesday, August 6th? We do, and there will be at least one contested election on our ballots.

Voting in local primary elections is a critical yet often overlooked part of civic engagement. These elections can significantly shape the landscape of a community by determining which candidates will be on the ballot in the November general election. Those candidates will set the tone for the issues that will be prioritized in the general election, and championed once they are in office.

Engaging in the primary process allows voters to elevate important local issues, such as education, public safety, housing, and environmental policies. Primary elections, however, have historically low voter turnout compared to general elections. This means that each vote in a primary has more influence. A small, motivated group of voters can have a substantial impact on the outcome, making it even more important for a broad cross-section of our community to participate.



Here are three simple steps to vote your voice in this year's August 6th primary election (plus a step for the general election):

1. Visit myvoteinfo.voteks.org to check your voter registration, view your sample ballot and find your voting location.
2. **Vote on or before Tuesday, August 6th.**
3. Post your "I Voted" selfie using the hashtags #RPpride #VoteJOCO.
4. Then, visit myvoteinfo.voteks.org again and make sure you're ready to vote in the November 5th general election.

Roeland Park Overhauls its Municipal Code

The City Council has directed staff to review and make recommended modifications to the entire municipal code for the City of Roeland Park. Some of these codes were adopted decades ago and may no longer be relevant or the most logical for modern times. For each chapter, the staff member that is most impacted by that section will review the code considering best practices, current law and how to simplify or add clarity to the code where possible. In addition, the City's Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee is reviewing each section with an equity lens and making their recommendations to Council as well. This process is already underway and will take two years to complete. The City hired a consultant to review the Zoning and Subdivision Regulations due to the complexity of that section. The Planning Commission held a public hearing on July 16th to review and approve the proposed changes. The City Council is set to review these at the August 5th City Council meeting.

The Essential Role of Mental Health Co-Responders

Mental health co-responders are transforming how communities handle crises. Working alongside law enforcement, these professionals bring expertise and compassion to situations involving individuals experiencing mental health issues. Their presence ensures that those in crisis receive appropriate care and support, reducing the risk of escalation and promoting better outcomes for everyone involved.

By providing immediate mental health assessment and intervention, co-responders help de-escalate potentially volatile situations, divert individuals from the criminal justice system, and connect them with necessary services. This integrated approach not only enhances public safety but also fosters a more humane and effective response to mental health emergencies, illustrating the profound impact of mental health co-responders in our communities.

Our Johnson County (JOCO) Co-Responders can be contacted by dialing 911, by using the Johnson County Co-Responder Program Map located on the joco.gov website or by calling their 24/7 crisis line at 913-268-0156. The JOCO Mental Health Center also offers free or low-cost trainings if you want to learn more about supporting a loved one through a crisis. City Grant and Assistance Programs Spotlight

As we move into August and September, Roeland Park continues to prioritize supporting our residents through various grant and assistance programs. Here's a detailed look at what's available:

- **JoCo Minor Home Rehabilitation Program:** This program helps homeowners maintain their properties with essential repairs, ensuring safe and comfortable living conditions. The program provides grant funds for repairs that include: Carpentry, Electrical, Exterior painting, Furnace / central air conditioner, Handicap accessibility, Masonry, Plumbing, and Roof replacement. These repairs may be provided to remedy a city citation or notification by a city/county code inspector of a deficiency for deteriorating or peeling paint.
- **Property Tax Rebate Program:** This program is designed to alleviate some of the burden of home ownership in the face of rising property values. This program will rebate 100% of the City's portion of property taxes to those who meet the Dept. of Housing and Urban Development's income guidelines for Johnson County. The program's goal is to help all residents remain in their homes and to help make it more affordable to do so.

- **Compose Bin Rebate Program:** The City of Roeland Park is committed to helping residents divert organic materials from landfills and is offering a rebate to residents to begin a home composting program. Eligible residents can get a rebate of up to \$75 for the purchase of a home compost bin or by building one.
- **Utility & Rental Assistance:** Temporary assistance is available to help residents facing financial challenges with utility bills and rental payments through Johnson County Aging & Human Services.

Temporary Traffic Calming Measures Coming to Buena Vista

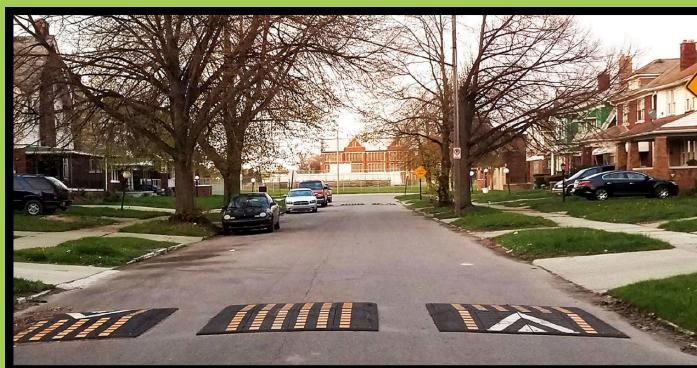
On July 15th, the City Council approved the installation of temporary traffic calming measures on Buena Vista in Roeland Park which includes four separate installations between 51st and 53rd Streets on Buena Vista. Two speed humps will be installed, the first just south of the stop sign at 51st Street, and the second just south of Sycamore Drive and north of Catalina. Two speed tables will be installed south of Catalina Street and another between W 52nd Terrace and north of W 53rd Terrace. All temporary devices will have wheel cutouts to accommodate emergency vehicles.

The purpose of the temporary installations is to test the effectiveness of these devices prior to installing any permanent solutions. The temporary devices can be purchased at minimal cost to the City and can be repurposed in the future for additional testing in other locations throughout the City when needed.

City traffic engineers will gather data about speed and volume of vehicles on the roadway as well as gather feedback from residents on how they feel about these

installations after they are in place.

The traffic calming devices will be installed in August or September. After installation, you will get an opportunity to experience these for yourself. We encourage your feedback! You can submit your thoughts through a form on our website.
